

SELECTION AND PRESENTATION OF THE NEWS

INVESTIGATION

- 1) Compare two different news sources (one from *list a* and one from *list b*), in terms of which news values their top story contains.
 - a) Guardian, Independent, Telegraph, BBC
 - b) Sun, Daily Mail, Daily Mirror, Daily Express
- 2) Compare the different news values between the top stories selected by the news sources, and the 'most read' sections.
- 3) Find an example of a news story, in which **language** is being used to make an event/issue:
 - a) Appear important
 - b) Connect to people's emotions
 - c) Be more shocking
- 4) **Norm setting** is where expected behaviour is reinforced. Find an example of a news story which:
 - a) Encourages conformity
 - b) Discourages non-conformity
- 5) Find a news story which is an example of **churnalism**, where the journalist hasn't discovered information themselves, but are just repeating someone else's work (e.g. a press release).
- 6) Find a news story which is an example of a **moral panic**, where a group (or activities of a group) are viewed as a threat society's values.
